Background

CircuitousRoot is the name under which I (Dr. David M. MacMillan) publish my research and, insofar as I can, also reprint historical materials. I do this as a nonprofit avocation, for the good of the craft. Some of this research involves the creation of physical devices, components, and machine (sometimes I finish this just through a design stage, but sometimes I go all the way to the production of real objects). In all cases, I intend these things to be “Open Source Hardware” which may be made freely by anyone.

At times, I also manufacture some of these items myself and offer them for sale. When I do this, I sell them under the auspices of **The Singing Lemur LLC**. If and when I do so, I am simply another maker. These designs remain Open Source Hardware and are in no way proprietary to The Singing Lemur LLC.

The following Terms and Conditions apply.

The Public Domain

The underlying principles and ideas of all of the devices and machines in which I am interested date back many decades (sometimes centuries). Frequently they are attested from the 18th century and earlier. Unless specifically noted otherwise, I believe them now to be entirely in the Public Domain.

I make no intellectual property claims other than asserting copyright on material that I have written, drawn, or CAD modeled myself. When I do so I will use "copyleft" Free and Open Source licensing terms to make this new material freely available.

Open-Source Hardware

The particular design and implementation of these devices and machines, and their documentation, are Open Source Hardware. This means that:

1. You may make this device or machine, or derivative versions of it, if you wish. You may do this for profit, if you wish.
2. You may not stop anyone else from making it.
3. If you create a derivative version, you are encouraged to license it as Open Source Hardware. If you choose otherwise, you should be aware that the action of proprietizing public domain and open source hardware will brand you as a [insert the extremely derogatory term of your choice here] who is unworthy of the company of others.
4. In all cases, if you choose to reproduce the CircuitousRoot or Singing Lemur documentation which describes this device or machine, including engineering drawings and CAD models, you must adhere to the open-source licensing terms of this documentation.
5. You may use any of my trademarks (“CircuitousRoot,” “Singing Lemur,” or “LEMUR.COM”) solely to identify the source of this design, but you must not do so in any way which suggests that these marks are yours or that I endorse your work. Be proud of your work and identify it as your own!
